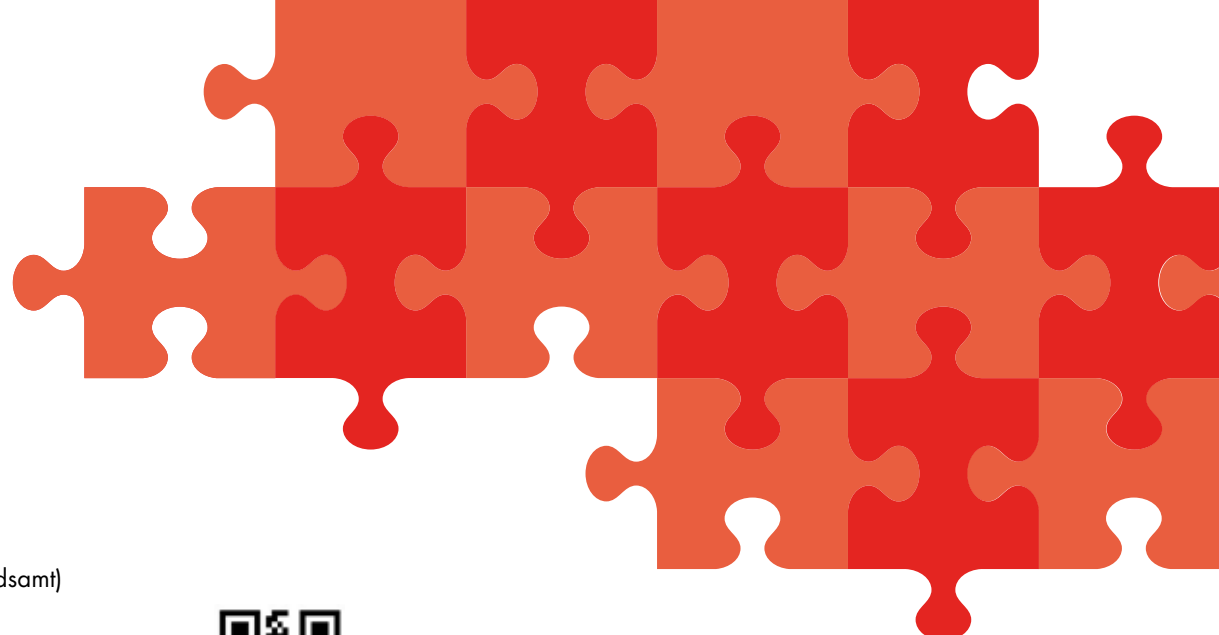

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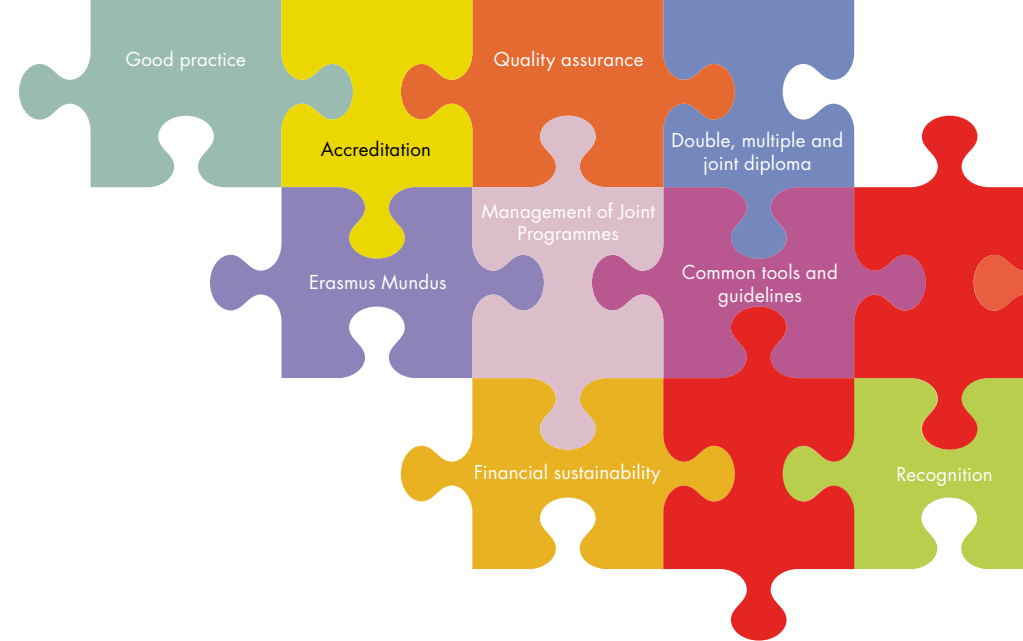

For a duration of five months, the seven consortia are set off with the common goal of developing a fictive Master or Doctoral Degree Programme. During that process, they get to know their institutional background, gain knowledge on national legislation, and experience realistic debates and obstacles in a safe laboratory situation. And, they learn a lot by producing relevant documents and presenting them to the public in Bologna on June 13th, 2012. Finally, they are contributing to a JOI.CON publication available under [www.joiman.eu](http://www.joiman.eu) in the beginning of 2013.

JOI.CON is coordinated by Leipzig University as an offspring of the JOIMAN project that was coordinated by the University of Bologna from 2008 until 2010. Both projects joined forces to tackle the management perspective on study programmes with international partners that lead to a double or joint degree. “Am I allowed to charge tuition fees”, “How will we organise the admission of students”, “What should a cooperation agreement include” – those are just few of the bulk of questions that both academic and administrative coordinators of Joint Programmes have to face. JOI.CON works as a catalyst triggering those questions for its teams and helps them to arrive at solid and sustainable answers. Alumni of the JOI.CON degree simulation not only learn a lot about how to establish a Joint Programme but they also share their insights with you.
